#### WATER RESOURCES

CCCD staff sampled at 14 sites across two 303(d) listed impaired waterways during 2022 - 2023;

- ♦ Little Powder River (LPR)
- ♦ Donkey-Stonepile Creek (DC-SC)

The District is able to conduct water quality monitoring on both LPR and DC-SC thanks to the Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality's (WDEQ) Clean Water Act Section 319 grant funding. Work conducted on DC-SC is a collaborative effort with the Crook County Natural Resource District (CCNRD).

A variety of factors have been identified as contributors to the impairments, including;

- ◊ Wildlife
- ◊ Livestock
- Omestic Animals
- ◊ Urban & Stormwater Runoff
- ♦ Septic Systems











Both the Little Powder River and Donkey-Stonepile Creek are impaired for *Escherichia coli*.

In addition to *E. coli*, CCCD also sampled for a suite of other water quality parameters to assess the overall health of LPR and DC-SC;

CCCD has set an aggressive goal of a 5% reduction in bacterial concentrations in LPR by 2024.

Through various funding pathways, CCCD provided cost-share opportunities to landowners for Best Management Practices (BMPs) to be implemented on both private and public lands throughout Campbell County.

**BEST MANAGEMENT PRACTICES** 

Funds for BMP opportunities were allocated through grant opportunities provided by;

- ♦ Wyoming Department of Agriculture (WDA)
- Wyoming Department of Environmental Quality (WDEQ)
- ♦ United States Forest Service (USFS)
- ♦ Bureau of Land Management (BLM)
- ◊ Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)

Most of the BMPs executed through the District are focused on the improvement of surface water quality while supporting the development of the landowner's operation.

CCCD believes the application of relevant practices along the impaired waterways of Campbell County will assist in reducing *E. coli* concentrations and attaining primary contact recreation standards set forth by the WDEQ.





CCCD was a recipient of funding for the first time from WDA's 2022 Rangeland Health Assessment Program (RHAP).

Working with a private contractor, CCCD staff assisted with the inventory of 8,658 acres across dual-purpose (private and livestock operation) properties North of Gillette.

Employing methods described in Interpreting Indicators of Rangeland Health (1734-6), staff collected the following data at each site;

#### 2023 Tree Sale

CCCD held its annual tree sale to promote the importance of trees for conservation planting efforts within Campbell County.

Perennials were also sold for the first time in 2022 to expand District sale offerings and encourage the cultivation of pollinator-friendly species.

From July 2022 to June 2023, CCCD staff served 3,178 Youth & 972 Adults through educational opportunities within Campbell County.

CCCD was awarded grant funding in both 2022 and 2023 to increase educational capacity through two projects;

#### "Growth Through Growth" Y.E.S. House Learning Garden

Funded under the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) Urban Agriculture Conservation (UAC) grant program, CCCD expanded upon an established garden space and coordinated workshops on a variety of urban agriculture-related topics such as tree planting and native bird population support.

#### "WY Roots Run Deep" CCCD Soil Trailer

Funded under the 2023 Friends of NACD and Wyoming Community Foundation grant programs, as well as partner funding, CCCD began the development of a mobile, inclusively designed educational trailer to promote the importance and awareness of soil health. This project will focus on the Wyoming geographic area and be intended to educate both youth and adult audiences.
